NOLAN OF BALLINDERRY.

NOLAN, JOHN PHILIP, Esq. of Ballinderry, co. Galway, J.P., M.P. for North Galway, late Lieut.-Col. R.A., b. 3 Aug. 1838.

Lineage.—Our ancient writers, the national records, private monuments, monumental and traditional history, all bear testimony to the origin and pedigree of the O'Nolans. Keating, the historian, in tracing the royal genealogies of Ireland, comes to Conn Ceadh Cathach, "Conn of the hundred battles," whom he states to have had two brothers. From Eochaidh Fiann, one of them, descended O'Nuallain, otherwise O'Nolan, and O'Ferrall, "Linea Antigua" (Ulster's Office) gives the detailed descent of John O'Nolan from this Eochaidh Fiann, brother of Conn, Monarch of Ireland.

The chief of the sept. of O'Nolan, which gave name to the district of Fothart O'Nolan, submitted and did homage to King HENRY II., who confirmed to him his possessions and rights. Camden, in his *Britannia*, refers to the O'Nolans, as does Cox, in his *Hibernia*. The Leinster line of the family, the O'Nolans of Ballykealy, co. Carlow, continued to preserve their estate until about the middle of the last century, a very remarkable example of ancient and continuous territorial possession. Hardiman, in his *History of Galway*, records that during the reigns of HENRY VI. and EDWARD IV. several ancient families settled in the town of Galway, and he especially mentions the O'Nolans. Their ancient family seat in Connacht was the Castle of Ballinrobe, of which THOMAS NOLAN, Esq. d. seized 18 June, 1623, leaving Agnes Martin, his widow, and Gregory, his son and heir. A great portion of their property of Ballinrobe was confiscated in the civil war of 1641, but a part still remains with their representatives and heirs, the Ballinderry family. There were two lines of the O'Nolans: one, that seated at Ballinderry, we now describe; the other was of Loughboy, co. Mayo. Several marriages took place between the O'Nolans and the Burkes of Clanricarde and Mayo. The immediate ancestor of the present representative of the Nolans of Ballinderry,

PATRICK NOLAN, Esq. of Ballinderry (son of JOHN NOLAN, Esq. of the same place), had several confirmatory grants of land in the cos. of Mayo and Galway temp. CHARLES II. (*Records of the Rolls*, vol. xii., Ulster's Office). He m. 1667, Anne, dau. (by Mary his wife, dau. of Sir Dominick Browne, of Carra Browne, co. Galway) of Sir John Browne, Bart. of The Neale, ancestor of the noble Houses of Kilmaine and Sligo and had, with other issue,

JOHN NOLAN, Esq. of Ballinderry, m. Feb. 1709, Ellis, 2nd dau. of William Brabazon, Esq. of New Park, co. Mayo, Capt.

of a troop of horse in King JAMES II.'s army, and one of the Commissioners for the capitulation of Limerick, by Mary his 1st wife, dau. of George Browne, Esq. of The Neale, and had a son and heir,

PATRICK NOLAN, Esq. of Ballinderry, m. a dau. of [unclear] of Tuillyra Castle, co. Galway, and was s. by his son,

JOHN NOLAN, Esq. of Ballinderry, m. Margaret, dau. and heir of James French, Esq. of Port-a-Carron, Lough Corrib, co. Galway, and was father of a son and successor,

JOHN NOLAN, Esq. of Ballinderry, m. Sept. 1809, Mary, dau. of John Browne, Esq. of Castle Moyle, and by her (who d. 1852) had a son,

JOHN NOLAN, Esq. of Ballinderry, J.P., m. Sept. 1826, Mary Anne, dau. of Walter Nolan, Esq. of Loughboy, and d. 27 April, 1847, leaving issue,

JOHN PHILIP, now of Ballinderry.
