But all the vacant Places being fupplied, and yet many Families in this very populous Town not being provided for, a worthy Gentleman, and noble Benefador, Tho. Layton, of Randon, Efq; was fo kind (having received Part of his Education at the Schrol here) as to promife a Thourand Pounds towards the erecting a New Church, upon the fubfribing of Two thoufand by the Inhabitants, which will doubtlefs be performed in a fmall Time; there being in a very few Days (ben fore I came to London to finifh this Work). Fifteen hundred Pounds fabicribed with great Alacrity, of which the worfhipful Will. Rooke Efg; the prefent Mayor, was One hundred, and the Aldermen proportionably, with the principal Inhabitants, of whom it may be affirmed without Flattery, that the generality are zealous for every good Work, and fome even above their Abilities. The great Difficulty was to procure an Endowment that it might be no Prejudice to the Lecturers at the other Churches, whereupon Application was made to the Reverend and Cbaritable Mr. Henry Robinfon, who moft generoufly promifed to endow it with Eighty Pounds per Ammmn : So that 'tis hoped a new Sanctuary will 'hortly arife, to the Glory of God, and Happinefs of fucceeding Ages; and that this will be attended with the like Succefs, that the ico Pound was, which this worthy Benefactor fent to Rotberam, which laid the Foundation of a very flourihing Cbarity-School there; he gives to the Cbarity-School in this Town alfo Ten Pounds per Annwm : And in many other Inflances (too many, and too fecret to be particularly enumerated) imitateth his renowned Uncle Fobw Harrifon Efq; the noble Founder of St. Yohn's Church in this Town. The like Sum of Ten Pounds per Annum is given to the Cbarity-School by another worthy Benefacior Will. Mil${ }^{\mathrm{me}} \mathrm{Efg}$; who moft generoully fubfrribed Two handred Pounds tomards the Building of the propofed Nex Church.

Lapton Efq; obligeth me to infert the Arms (Argent a Feffe between fix Crofs Croflets Fitchec, Sable, ) and Pedegree of that ancient Family of Laston, of Wefto Lston, for which I am obliged to the Reverend Mr. Will. Smith ReGor of Melfonly, and Sir Pbilip Conffable's M. S. with which I collared it.

A large Praffran Boot of red Leather for a very lufty Man, yet the Heel but an lnch and a half broad. The Gift of the Lady Perrot. Another from Twrkey, of yellow Leather as Jarge, yet hath no Heel at all, but a thin Red Leather the Length of the whole Foot. Don. S. Molinenx Arm. A little one for a Boy, from Pruffia, with a fmall Iron Plate for the Heel; as alfo the firt hath. Don. Rev. Tho. Whitaker V DM. Thefe are for the richer Sort. Here is a Shoe for the Meaner; it is made of the Bark of Trees fomewhat after the Manner of Coal-Baskets in the North of England, but much coarfer; they are generally worn by the poor People in Litbmania and Prufla, who bind it to the Leg by the Cord which feems to be of platted Sedges. Don. D. Suf. Madox. A Sabot, or French Wooden Shoe. An Irijo Brogive. An Englifb Shoe of very antiqueFForm. A Silk Shoe from Tyman, a City of Formofa; it is made of Crimfon and yellow Silk, adorned with Needle-work (for which the Formofan Women are famous $\left._{3}\right)_{3}$ as is alfo the Silk upon the Heel, which is large confidering the Smainels of the Shoe, for the cripled Lady: This was brought from thence, and given me by Dr. Midgetey of this Town. A Pair of Portugwefe Shoes for a Gentlewoman, the upper Leather pink'd ; as is alfo the red Turkey Leather upon the Heels. Don. S. Molinenx Arm. A very odd Shoe, the Heel fix Inches bigh, yet Length of the Foot $5 \frac{1}{3}$ from the Toe to the Heel inclufive. A Pair of Slippers from Tumke, a Crefcent, or Semicircle of Iron for the Heel, (from Mr. Molimenx.) One of Straxp from Dantzig. Don. D. Fo. Fac. Smidt. A PerfianSlipper, very curious Workmanihip. And one from Pruffia of red Turkey Leather; the Cork Sole an Inch thick, covered with gilded Leather. A blew Satten Slipper, with Silver Lace, for Charles Savage Efq; (a younger Son of the firt Earl of Rivers) given me by my Brother, who married one of his Daughters and Coheirs.

The Abbot of KirkStal's Stirrap; it is of Caft Iron, the Sole feven Inches broad ; given me by Mr. Pollard of Nero-Lath near Kirkffal. Spurs : One of Copper gilded, with a remarkable Neck, above fix Inches long from the Heel to the Rowel. There is a DanijS Spur of the fame Length in the Bodleian Repofitory at Oxford; of which fee Mr. Hearn's ingenious Difcourfe of Antiquities annexed to the firt Vol. of Leland's Itinerary, p. 114. A Gingling Spur; it is of Brals, the Neck Chort, but Rowel very large, three Inches from Point to Point ; the Danif乃 Rowel hath fix Points, this only five: That of Sir Ferdinando Leghs (of which before) hath twelve. Both thefe were given me by Mr. Sam. Smith Bell-founder. Another gilt Spur of a different Form from all the reft : A noted Antiquary tells us, that from their gilt Spurs, Knights are Atiled Equites Axrati. (Selden's Titus of Honorr, p. 437. © p. 474.) Of the Spanifh Cavallero's de Efpula d'Orada, or Knights of the Golden Spars, fee the fame Autbor, p.575. Don. D. Godfr. Haddon. An odd Sort of a jointed Spur, with a fir pointed Rowel, but not made to torn round as all the former do; and alfo thofe of later Times in-laid with Silver, of "rhich bere are two or three Sorts. There is almoft as great Variety in the Bucher 45 in the Rowels, from little more than half an Inch to near three inches in Breadth.

A frot-pontuet; a Sort of Encentris of three Points in a Plate of Iron to ferem under the Shoe Heel; it is ufed by both Sexes for more fecure watking the locy Streets, or parting the Rivers in Prwfilu, where they are fometimes froven to that Degree, that the old Duke of Bunv denburgh muftered Ten thoufand Men upon the Ice at the Corifh Hof.

Ford had only one Child, which died an Infant with its Mother.) Mary, Eliz. (who married Mr. Tho. Prior of Daventry) Frances and Anne unmarried.
Page 69, Robert Fairfax, of Steeton, Efq; Member of Parliament for the City of Yorke, An. $171{ }_{5}^{3}$, hath built a pleafant Seat at Newton near Tadeafter, and given Communion-Plate to the Church there.

Holman hath lately favoured me with this Abftract from his very curious Manufeript Hiftory of Effex, wherein the Thoreshys of that County (deduced from a younger Branch of this in YorkeAbire) is prefaced with this French Infcription (concerning Agkfrith the firt in the printed Pedigree) from an ancient Manulcript. "Spayn "Roy de Danemark le quel conquit Empleterre, \& commença a rey"ner in l'An de Grace mille \& xvii \& regna xix, avoit un Noble "Baron de mefme la ligne appelle Aykfrith qui fuit Sur: de Skdbergb "\& Dent, de Askrig, Woodball, Laybarne, Holtby, Mar---burgh, Ilketon, "Neroton, Tanfelde, Woth, Melmorby, Normanby, Carethorp, les queux "Seigneurs \& villes apres fon deceffe defcenderent a Arkill fon fils, fi "come de percelle dicealx pluis phainement appeirt per le livere de "Domefday quell Will. Conqueror filt faire." By the Pedigree which accompanied this, it appears, That JoFm de Tboresby and Margaret Daughter of Will. Routh had 1ffue three Sons, Hugh his Heir from whom defcended the Yorkefire Famity (as Page 72 of this Book) Ro bert and William. Robert, wha was of Wockin in Norfolk was Father of Henry Thoresby, who married Helen Danghter and Co-Heir of 7\%o. Fotberinghey by Eliz. his Wife, who was Daughter and Heir of Whi Durward by Margery Daughter and Co-heir of Sir Roger Harffick, which faid William was Son of Jobn Durvard Speaker of Parliament in the Reigns of Rich. 2. Hen. 4 and Hen, 5. (Vifit. of Effex, M.S. Col. Arm. Lorid.) who died 37 Hen. 6. In Right of this Match the Thoresbys of Bocking enjoyed the Manors of Durnard, Hall, Bradford, and Shil ford, in Bocking, Braintree, and adjacent Parifhes, 2 Mills, 1000 Acres of Arable Land, 200 of Meadow, and 1000 Acres of Pafture, Coc. Alfo the Manor of Aylresford confifing of about 700 Acres, bec. Amme, the youngeft Daughter and Co-heir (Sifter of the faid Helen Thoresby) was married to Fobn de Vere Earl of Oxford. Thomas Thoresby, fecond Son of the faid Henry and Helen, marrying fane, Daughter and Heir of Sir Tho. Bargoin had Iffue Thomas Thoresby, of Wockin, Efq; who married Ann Daughter of Sir Tho. Knevet of Buckwase Caftle, by Mariel Daughter of Thomas Duke of Norfolk his fecond Wife, from whom iffued Francis Thoresby, of Comijbam in Norfolk, Efq; who married Mayy Lady Dacres, Reliá of Tha-Lord Ducres, Daughter of George Lord $D^{\prime}$ dubigney, whofe Son and Heir George Thoresby was, living Ave, r\$os. Page 75, Fohn Rookes, of Rodes-hall, Efq; died 30 May 1713.
Page 76, Fohns Perrot eldelt Son of Rich, Perrot B. D. was aged 74' Hamas Lady Perrot died Nov. 19 iz.

Wife, Meek, which reduceth me to what is more particularly the Defign of this Place, viz. fuch Qualities, Perfections or Imperfections, as are extraordinary in the Bodies or Minds of Men.

Among the ankient Romans, even the Confular Dignity (which was the higheft), received an addition of Honour from the Number of Children, and the Lex Fulia gave the Precedency to him that had moft Children ( $y$ ) ; upon which Account, as well as that of his ancient Family, Gervafe Nevile of Holbeck, Efq; deferved the Preference, having by his vertuous Confort (of the Honourable Family of Cavendifb) nine Sons and feven Daughters, of which the greatef Number lived to be Men and Women, the eldeft Son William Nevile Efq; is High-Sheriff of the County this prefent Year 1711, and had two of his Brothers to preach before the Judges. My honoured and dear Father and Mother had fifteen Children during their eighteen Years happy Cohabitation, and my Father and Mother-in-law the fame Number, all fingle Birtbs; fo that the Mother and Daughter were Child-bearing Women at the fame Time. Elizabetb Daughter of Richard Lord Latimer, married Sir Cbrifopher Danby of Farnely, to whom the bore fix Sons and eight Daughters, all married, but Katharine Lady Danby (Daughter of Chrifopher Wandsforth, Efq; LordDeputy of Ireland) died of her fifteenth Child in the thirtieth Year of her Age (z). Our ingenious Hydrographer, Mr. George Sorocold has alydy had thirteen Children, (of whom eight were living at the fame Time) all fingle Births, and all nurfed by his Wife, before he was twenty-eight Years of Age. Mr. Thomas Bernard of this Town was fifty Years old before he married, yet had eighteen Children, fome of whom with his Relict live now here; he will occur as a remarkable Inftance of a vegete old Age, living to be above an Hundred. Matthem Bentley of Leeds, has had nineteen Children (but by two Wives) of which, Eleven (by Mary his fecond Wife, yet living) were born in the fpace of twelve Years and a Quarter, and were all fingle Births, fome of them now living, lufty young Men, The faid Matthew was the firft who kept a Hackney-Coach in Leeds, as Richard Sykes Efq; (my Father-in-law before-mentioned) was the firf private Gentleman who kept one for his own Ufe. The firt Thomas Lord Fairt fax of Denton (befides Daughters) had ten Sons, of whom Williama celebrated Major, was flain in the Palatinate, as was alfo bis Brother $\mathrm{Fobn}^{2}$; and near the fame Tine Peregrine in France, and Thomas in Turky, all four in the fame Year 1621 .

Mr. Fofeph Boyee the noted N. C. Minifter of. Dablin, was one of the fixteen Children of Mr. Matthen Boyfe of Leeds. Dr. Ralph Bathurft Dean of Bath and Wells, was one of feventeen of his Father (Vide Pedigree, pag. 13.) fixteen of which lived to be Men and Women. Mr. George Perrot of Leeds, Merchant, is the fixteenth (or eighteenth) of the old Lady Perrot's, who is yet living, a comely grave Matron, and had the Satisfaction to fee one Son Mayor of Hull the laft Year, and another Lord-Mayor of York this, as his Father had formerly been. Frances, Wife of the Learned Dr. George Hickes, late Dean of Worcefter, was Daughter of Mr. Charles Mallory, the Son or Grandfon (I remember not whether) of Sir Fohn Mallory, who was attended to his Grave by twelve Sons and five Daughters. Armigell Wade Efq; had (by his two Wives) twenty Children of whom the noted Sir Williams Wade was eldeft. But Elizabeth the Mother of Ga/per
