THE Memoirs of some eminent Persons in all the preceding Pedigrees, are to be inserted in the Historical Part, according to the several Ages they flourish'd in; but in one of 20 Descents shall rarely be found a like Number of learned and ingenious Gentlemen, eminent Dignitaries, and pious Authors, as in this of the *Watkinsons*, with the inoculated Branches. *Watkinson* bears Or, a Fels between 3 Mulletts Azure. It was before intimated that a Gallery was erected along the South-side of the Parish-Church at *Leedes* this present Year 1714. But all the vacant Places being supplied, and yet many Families in this very populous Town not being provided for, a worthy Gentleman, and noble Benefactor, *Tho. Layton*, of *Rawdon*, Esq; was so kind (having received Part of his Education at the School here) as to promise a Thousand Pounds towards the erecting a *New Church*, upon the subscribing of Two thousand by the Inhabitants, which will doubtless be performed in a small Time; there being in a very few Days (before I came to *London* to finish this Work) Fifteen hundred Pounds subscribed with great Alacrity, of which the worshipful *Will. Rooke* Esq; the present Mayor, was One hundred, and the Aldermen proportionably, with the principal Inhabitants, of whom it may be affirmed without Flattery, that the generality are zealous for every good Work, and some even above their Abilities. The great Difficulty was to procure an Endowment that it might be no Prejudice to the Lecturers at the other Churches, whereupon Application was made to the Reverend and Charitable Mr. *Henry Robinson*, who most generously promised to endow it with Eighty Pounds *per Annum*: So that 'tis hoped a new Sanctuary will shortly arise, to the Glory of God, and Happiness of succeeding Ages; and that this will be attended with the like Success, that the 100 Pound was, which this worthy Benefactor sent to *Rotheram*, which laid the Foundation of a very flourishing *Charity-School* there; he gives to the *Charity-School* in this Town also Ten Pounds *per Annum*: And in many other Instances (too many, and too secret to be particularly enumerated) imitateth his renowned Uncle *John Harrison* Esq; the noble Founder of *St. John's Church* in this Town. The like Sum of Ten Pounds *per Annum* is given to the *Charity-School* by another worthy Benefactor *Will. Milner* Esq; who most generously subscribed Two hundred Pounds towards the Building of the proposed *New Church*.

GRATITUDE to the first named Benefactor, *Tho. Layton* Esq; obligeth me to insert the Arms (Argent a Fesse between six Crosses Crozlets Fitchee, Sable,) and Pedegree of that ancient Family of *Layton*, of *West-Layton*, for which I am obliged to the Reverend Mr. *Will. Smith* Rector of *Meltonby*, and Sir *Philip Constable's* M. S. with which I collated it.

A large *Prussian Boot* of red Leather for a very lusty Man, yet the Heel but an Inch and a half broad. The Gift of the *Lady Perrot*. Another from *Turkey*, of yellow Leather as large, yet hath no Heel at all, but a thin Red Leather the Length of the whole Foot. Don. S. *Molineux* Arm. A little one for a Boy, from *Prussia*, with a small Iron Plate for the Heel; as also the first hath. Don. Rev. *Tho. Whitaker* V D M. These are for the richer Sort. Here is a *Shoe* for the Meaner; it is made of the *Bark of Trees* somewhat after the Manner of Coal-Baskets in the North of *England*, but much coarser; they are generally worn by the poor People in *Lithuania* and *Prussia*, who bind it to the Leg by the Cord which seems to be of platted Sedges. Don. D. *Suf. Madox*. A *Sabot*, or French Wooden Shoe. An *Irish Brogue*. An *English Shoe* of very antique Form. A *Silk Shoe* from *Tyvan*, a City of *Formosa*; it is made of Crimson and yellow Silk, adorned with Needle-work (for which the *Formosan Women* are famous); as is also the Silk upon the Heel, which is large considering the Smallness of the Shoe, for the crippled Lady: This was brought from thence, and given me by Dr. *Midgeley* of this Town. A Pair of *Portuguese Shoes* for a Gentlewoman, the upper Leather pink'd; as is also the red *Turkey Leather* upon the Heels. Don. S. *Molineux* Arm. A very odd Shoe, the Heel six Inches high, yet Length of the Foot $5\frac{1}{2}$; from the Toe to the Heel inclusive. A Pair of *Slippers* from *Turkey*, a Crescent, or Semicircle of Iron for the Heel, (from Mr. *Molineux*.) One of *Straw* from *Dantzic*. Don. D. *Jo. Jac. Smidt*. A *Persian Slipper*, very curious Workmanship. And one from *Prussia* of red *Turkey Leather*; the *Cork Sole* an Inch thick, covered with gilded Leather. A blew Satten Slipper, with Silver Lace, for *Charles Savage Esq;* (a younger Son of the first Earl of *Rivers*) given me by my Brother, who married one of his Daughters and Cohairs.

The *Abbot of Kirkstall's Stirrup*; it is of Cast Iron, the Sole seven Inches broad; given me by Mr. *Pollard* of *New-Lath* near *Kirkstall*. *Spurs*: One of Copper gilded, with a remarkable Neck, above six Inches long from the Heel to the Rowel. There is a *Danish Spur* of the same Length in the *Bodleian Repository* at *Oxford*; of which see Mr. *Hearn's* ingenious Discourse of Antiquities annexed to the first Vol. of *Leland's Itinerary*, p. 114. A *Gingling Spur*; it is of Brass, the Neck short, but Rowel very large, three Inches from Point to Point; the *Danish Rowel* hath six Points, this only five: That of *Sir Ferdinando Leghs* (of which before) hath twelve. Both these were given me by Mr. *Sam. Smith* Bell-founder. Another gilt Spur of a different Form from all the rest: A noted Antiquary tells us, that from their gilt *Spurs*, Knights are stiled *Equites Aurati*. (*Selden's Titles of Honour*, p. 437. & p. 474.) Of the *Spanish Cavallero's de Espuela d'Orada*, or Knights of the *Golden Spurs*, see the same Author, p. 575. Don. D. *Godfr. Haddon*. An odd Sort of a *jointed Spur*, with a six pointed Rowel, but not made to turn round as all the former do; and also those of later Times in-laid with Silver, of which here are two or three Sorts. Page 20, *Richard Richardson Esq;* M. D. is Justice of Peace, and Fellow of the Royal Society. The Reverend *Mr. John Richardson* is Præcentor and Prebendary of *Yorke*. *Mr. John Hopkinson* of *Lofthouse*, Brother to the said *Eliz.* and *Jane*, was the Author of that useful Manuscript so frequently mentioned in this Book for the Pedigrees of the Gentry in this West-Riding. Page 22, *Mr. Gilbert Cowper* M. A. is Vicar of *Rodborn-Cheney* in *Com. Wilts.* Page 23, *Jane*, Relict of *Mr. Fenay*, died 15 Aug. 1713.

Page 24, Read *Rockley-wheate* (or *Quire*). *Sir Thomas Rookby* obtained the Victory.

Page 27, *Mr. Bright Dixon* is succeeded by the Reverend and most ingenious *Mr. Henry Lodge* M. A. the present worthy Incumbent.

Page 29, *Dr. Langdale's* Benefactions is to be inserted with others hereafter; the famous Bishop *Jer. Taylor* married his Sister, by whom he had a Daughter married to *Dr. Marsh*, Archbishop of *Dublin*.

Page 30, Upon a Marble Monument lately erected against the North Wall of the Quire. M. S. Near to this Place is interred the Body of *Mr. John Gibson*, late Alderman and Mayor of this Corporation, An. 1702, who died 26 Dec. An. 1712, ætat. 63. Also of *Eliz.* his former Wife, and two Children Twins, *Sarah* and *Eliz.* who died 27 Dec. 1683. Also of his Daughter *Isabella*, late Wife of *Mr. Samuel Lacon*, who died 2 March, An. 1709, ætat. 29.

Upon another, very curious Marble Monument, is this Inscription (composed by *Rich. Thornton Esq;*)

Cushion answerable thereto. The surviving Issue of the late Lord Thomas are, *Thomas Lord Fairfax, Henry Culpeper, Robert, Margaret, Catharine, Frances and Mary. Tho. Fairfax, of Menfington, Esq;* is living at *Leedes, An. 1714*, aged 86, hath Issue the Rev. Mr. *Tho. Fairfax* (who by *Martha* Daughter and Heir of *Dr. Rich. Ford* had only one Child, which died an Infant with its Mother.) *Mary, Eliz.* (who married Mr. *Tho. Prior of Daventry*) *Frances* and *Anne* unmarried.

Page 69, *Robert Fairfax, of Steeton, Esq;* Member of Parliament for the City of *Yorke, An. 1712*, hath built a pleasant Seat at *Newton* near *Tadcaster*, and given Communion-Plate to the Church there.

Page 71, Mr. *Lawrence Brerets* died 9 Febr. 1712, his Father yet survives, aged 86.

Page 73, *Elizabeth* Daughter of *Jeremiah Thoresby* married *Joseph Cockbill* of *Leedes* hath Issue *Joseph*. The Reverend and very obliging Mr. *Will. Holman* hath lately favoured me with this Abstract from his very curious Manuscript History of *Essex*, wherein the *Thoresbys* of that County (deduced from a younger Branch of this in *Yorkshire*) is prefaced with this French Inscription (concerning *Aykfrith* the first in the printed Pedigree) from an ancient Manuscript. "Swayn Roy de *Danemark* le quel conquit *Engleterre*, & commença a regner in l'An de Grace mille & xvii & regna xix, avoit un Noble Baron de mesme la ligne appellé *Aykfrith* qui fuit Sur : de *Sudbergh & Dent, de Askrig, Woodball, Layburne, Holtby, Mar--burgh, Ilketon, Newton, Tanfelde, Woth, Melmorby, Normanby, Carethorp*, les queux Seigneurs & villes apres son decesse descenderent a *Arkill* son fils, si come de percelle diceulx plus plainement appeirt per le livre de *Domesday* quell *Will. Conqueror* fist faire." By the Pedigree which accompanied this, it appears, That *John de Thoresby* and *Margaret* Daughter of *Will. Routh* had Issue three Sons, *Hugh* his Heir from whom descended the *Yorkshire* Family (as Page 72 of this Book) *Robert* and *William*. *Robert*, who was of *Wockin* in *Norfolk*, was Father of *Henry Thoresby*, who married *Helen* Daughter and Co-heir of *Tho. Fotheringhey* by *Eliz.* his Wife, who was Daughter and Heir of *Will. Durward* by *Margery* Daughter and Co-heir of *Sir Roger Harfick*, which said *William* was Son of *John Durward* Speaker of Parliament in the Reigns of *Rich. 2. Hen. 4. and Hen. 5.* (Visit. of *Essex, M. S. Col. Arm. Lond.*) who died 37 *Hen. 6.* In Right of this Match the *Thoresbys* of *Bocking* enjoyed the Manors of *Durward, Hall, Bradford, and Shalford*, in *Bocking, Braintree*, and adjacent Parishes, 2 Mills, 1000 Acres of Arable Land, 200 of Meadow, and 1000 Acres of Pasture, &c. Also the Manor of *Aylresford* consisting of about 700 Acres, &c. *Anne*, the youngest Daughter and Co-heir (Sister of the said *Helen Thoresby*) was married to *John de Vere* Earl of *Oxford*. *Thomas Thoresby*, second Son of the said *Henry* and *Helen*, marrying *Jane*, Daughter and Heir of *Sir Tho. Burgoin* had Issue *Thomas Thoresby, of Wockin, Esq;* who married *Ann* Daughter of *Sir Tho. Knevet* of *Bucknam* Castle, by *Marriel* Daughter of *Thomas Duke of Norfolk* his second Wife, from whom issued *Francis Thoresby, of Comisham in Norfolk, Esq;* who married *Mary Lady Dacres*, Relict of *Tho. Lord Dacres*, Daughter of *George Lord D' Aubigny*, whose Son and Heir *George Thoresby* was, living *An. 1605*.

Page 75, *John Rookes, of Rodes-hall, Esq;* died 30 May 1713.

Page 76, *John Perrot* eldest Son of *Rich. Perrot B. D.* was aged 74. *Hannah Lady Perrot* died Nov. 1713.

Wife, Meek, which reduceth me to what is more particularly the Design of this Place, *viz.* such Qualities, Perfections or Imperfections, as are extraordinary in the Bodies or Minds of Men.

Among the ancient *Romans*, even the *Consular* Dignity (which was the highest) received an addition of Honour from the Number of Children, and the *Lex Julia* gave the Precedency to him that had most Children (*y*); upon which Account, as well as that of his ancient Family, *Gervase Nevile of Holbeck, Esq;* deserved the Preference, having by his vertuous Consort (of the Honourable Family of *Cavendish*) nine Sons and seven Daughters, of which the greatest Number lived to be Men and Women, the eldest Son *William Nevile Esq;* is High-Sheriff of the County this present Year 1711. and had two of his Brothers to preach before the Judges. My honoured and dear Father and Mother had fifteen Children during their eighteen Years happy Cohabitation, and my Father and Mother-in-law the same Number, all single Births; so that the Mother and Daughter were Child-bearing Women at the same Time. *Elizabeth* Daughter of *Richard Lord Latimer*, married *Sir Christopher Danby of Farnely*, to whom she bore six Sons and eight Daughters, all married, but *Katharine Lady Danby* (Daughter of *Christopher Wandsforth, Esq;* Lord-Deputy of *Ireland*) died of her fifteenth Child in the thirtieth Year of her Age (*z*). Our ingenious Hydrographer, *Mr. George Sorocold* has already had thirteen Children, (of whom eight were living at the same Time) all single Births, and all nursed by his Wife, before he was twenty-eight Years of Age. *Mr. Thomas Bernard* of this Town was fifty Years old before he married, yet had eighteen Children, some of whom with his Relict live now here; he will occur as a remarkable Instance of a vegete old Age, living to be above an Hundred. *Matthew Bentley of Leeds*, has had nineteen Children (but by two Wives) of which, Eleven (by *Mary* his second Wife, yet living) were born in the space of twelve Years and a Quarter, and were all single Births, some of them now living, lusty young Men, The said *Matthew* was the first who kept a *Hackney-Coach* in *Leeds*, as *Richard Sykes Esq;* (my Father-in-law before-mentioned) was the first private Gentleman who kept one for his own Use. The first *Thomas Lord Fairfax of Denton* (besides Daughters) had ten Sons, of whom *William* a celebrated Major, was slain in the *Palatinate*, as was also his Brother *John*; and near the same Time *Peregrine* in *France*, and *Thomas* in *Turky*, all four in the same Year 1621.

Mr. Joseph Boyse the noted N. C. Minister of *Dublin*, was one of the sixteen Children of *Mr. Matthew Boyse of Leeds*. *Dr. Ralph Bathurst* Dean of *Bath* and *Wells*, was one of seventeen of his Father (*Vide Pedigree, pag. 13.*) sixteen of which lived to be Men and Women. *Mr. George Perrot of Leeds, Merchant*, is the sixteenth (or eighteenth) of the old *Lady Perrot's*, who is yet living, a comely grave Matron, and had the Satisfaction to see one Son Mayor of *Hull* the last Year, and another Lord-Mayor of *York* this, as his Father had formerly been. *Frances*, Wife of the Learned *Dr. George Hickes*, late Dean of *Worcester*, was Daughter of *Mr. Charles Mallory*, the Son or Grandson (I remember not whether) of *Sir John Mallory*, who was attended to his Grave by twelve Sons and five Daughters. *Armigell Wade Esq;* had (by his two Wives) twenty Children of whom the noted *Sir William Wade* was eldest. But *Elizabeth* the Mother of *Jasper*
